The Bluegrass Golden Rule

OK, let's all admit it. Every one of us craves attention, recognition, compliments and acceptance. That's because we're all human, and these things are all absolutely necessary to maintain health and wellness.

Jamming can bring these wonderful, warm, fuzzy sensations to each of us.

But.... sometimes, it doesn't. Sometimes it brings embarrassment, humiliation or even anger. That's no fun. And it's not good for your health.

This is where the Bluegrass Golden Rule comes in. Here's the Rule: ***Are you listening to others the way you want them to listen to you?*** It's that simple.

Listening to someone playing music is pretty much the same as listening to someone expressing themselves with words. For effective communication to happen, both sides need to hear and understand what is being communicated.

Most of us have learned to not shout or interrupt or insult others during conversations (yes, I realize that, sadly, there are some people who haven't). The more of us that demonstrate good listening skills during a jam, the more warm, fuzzy feelings of affirmation and enjoyment will be experienced.

What do good jam listening skills look/sound like? Pretty much just like they do in a conversation:

- **Eye contact** – look around; smile, nod, let your facial expressions show appreciation for others' playing.
- **Know the unspoken rules** of Bluegrass Jamming (often referred to as "[The Ten Jammandments](#)"). If you're a newbie to jamming, start off with guided jams where the more experienced players can help you learn these rules.
- **Let your playing show respect** – playing too loudly, noodling, being out of tune or off the beat are all signs that you're not listening to others. These are signs of disrespect to all the others in the jam, and are likely to result in your feeling disrespected in return.


